### Susanne Bahn

### Tim Bentley

Tim Bentley is a Professor of Work and Wellbeing and Associate Dean Research in the School of Business and Law at Edith Cowan University, West Australia. Tim works with the School's Centre for Work and Organisational Performance (CWOP).

Tim's research primarily focuses on work and wellbeing and psychosocial risks, with a particular emphasis on job stress, workplace bullying and other forms of ill-treatment in the workplace. With a human factors background, Tim follows a systems approach to the analysis of workplace problems, and he has published widely in the broad occupational health, safety and wellbeing field.

Tim also researches in the future of work field, with an interest in the global forces and trends impacting on how individuals and communities live and work, and the importance industry places on understanding and managing the challenges and opportunities that such changes bring. Tim's most recent research activity focuses around the New Zealand Workplace Barometer, that monitors the presence and impact of psychosocial risks within a large number of New Zealand workplaces. Tim is also scientific lead for an HRC funded study evaluating the effectiveness of psychosocial safety climate as an organisational intervention to reduce psychological health outcomes associated with psychosocial risks.

PhD has worked as an academic, Occupational Hygienist, HSE Manager and consultant in the chemical, manufacturing, engineering and resources industries for over 30 years. Drew Dawson PhD is the Inaugural Engaged Research Chair at CQUni and Director of the Appleton Institute based in Adelaide. The Appleton Institute is a multi-disciplinary research group that brings together a range of discipline specialists in the broad field of applied social sciences.

He then spent a few years travelling and trying out nearly every first-year course available at several universities before completing a PhD in Psychology at Flinders University. Drew worked in the US for several years as a post-doc before returning to Australia in the early 90's. In addition to his research work, Drew works closely with industry and government around policy development in the areas of OHS and Safety Management. ## Natassia Goode

Natassia Goode BA (Hons), PhD, is a Senior Ergonomist in the Ergonomics and Human Factors Unit, Specialists, Programs and Licensing, WorkSafe Victoria. Prior to this appointment in 2019 Natassia was a Senior Research Fellow and Leader of the Organisational Safety Theme within the Centre for Human Factors and Sociotechnical Systems at the University of the Sunshine Coast. Natassia's honours and PhD research in Psychology at the University of Sydney was concerned with how people learn to solve problems in complex, dynamic and uncertain environments. Her research has subsequently focused on the application of systems theory and the development of human factors methods to enhance injury prevention efforts in occupational settings, including do-mains such as healthcare, construction, outdoor recreation and education, air freight and transport. Natassia's research interests include incident reporting, accident analysis, incident investigation methods and practice, work-related musculoskeletal disorders, manual handling and human factors methods. Her publications include over 30 peer re-viewed journal papers, and numerous conference papers and industry reports.

## **Fiona Haines**

Fiona Haines BA (Hons), PhD, FASSA is Professor of Criminology in the School of Social and Political Sciences, Adjunct Professor at RegNet in the College of Asia and Pacific at ANU and Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia. Fiona has undertaken extensive research in occupational health and safety, most notably in the areas of risk and regulation centred on the response to industrial deaths and disasters as well as research into globalisation and its impact on accountability of multinational corporations for human rights abuse.

His particular interests include developing and using sophisticated techniques to analyse biological samples for trace levels of toxic substances and their metabolites.
